Pastoral Reflections

A mocking bird was screeching at me and darting through the branches above my head, defending her unseen nest, as I sank my spade in the turf. I was lifting a square of sod and digging a little grave for Dubby, a dove who lived in an improvised aviary in the parsonage for twenty years.

Dubby came to be a companion for Birdyboy, a rehabbed but damaged homing pigeon who showed up in the churchyard, lost and sick, on September 11, 2001. From the moment the ring-necked dove was set next to the rock dove, the two of them bobbed and cooed and bonded. Almost immediately they both began laying eggs, revealing Birdyboy's gender and showing their complete contentment. When Birdy fell ill and expired exactly fourteen years after her arrival, I thought Dubby would probably not live more than a year or two. But she lived 7 1/2 years, and seemed content with her daily life of feeding, flying, perching, preening. She sang every morning, and if I sang while washing dishes at the kitchen sink, she would often add her voice. Whenever I would open the door she would fly eagerly to land on my finger, have her breast stroked, and be fed tiny pieces of cheese. No one could possibly know her and not feel that her nature was entirely sweet. Doves are symbols of peace for good reason.

Today is not the first time I've contemplated what is the very real connection that forms between people and their animal friends, although it may be a tad more surprising between mammal and bird—we are so different. What is the vibration-like thing that thrums when we hold them? What happens in us, and perhaps in them, that now brings heaviness to my chest and tightens my throat as I lay her in the ground? What can it be but love?

I think we are all aware that sometimes it's easier to love animals than the people around us. Our "pets" are unconditional in their attachment. They do not talk back, argue, or double-cross. And we can choose to stick with the doves, never dealing with the noisy crows, the aggressive sparrows, the thieving blue jays. Our "pets" do not bring egos into our relationships that impinge on our own egotism.

And yet, underneath our rough exteriors and bad attitudes, all the ways we humans annoy and bother one another, there is also in us a sweet and simple spirit waiting to be discovered. That is why in times of trial, in the battlefield foxhole, the cancer ward, the tornado shelter, people's guards drop away and they experience, to their surprise, inexplicable depths of love and compassion for each other.

This is a beautiful and challenging part of being Church together. We gather as very different persons who might not choose each other as friends out in the world, but in this fellowship try to let go of our differences and our friction, and see each other as simple spirits, children of God, made in God's image. We discover and uncover love in each other. Personally, I don't find it easy to do, but by God's grace it happens.

So I thank God today for Dubby, for her sweet spirit and and her simple love. She taught me.


